CARE.COM CFO RESIGNS, FORMER CFO TO STEP IN

Care.com, the Waltham-based provider of caregiver services, said its chief financial officer will resign later this month after more than a year on the

John Leahy, who previously was CFO at Bedford-based iRobot, will resign officially on Nov. 29, according to the company. Leahy has been at Care.com since April 2013.

GSN GAMES MOVES WALTHAM OFFICE TO BOSTON

GSN Games, the game development arm of the Game Show Network, has moved its local office from Waltham to

The company, whose owner is based in Santa Monica, Calif., moved into a 37,800-square-foot office at 100 Summer St. in Boston's Financial District. GSN Games currently employs 130 in Boston, and the new space can accommodate up to 240 employees. Currently, the company is hiring 10 employees at its Boston office.

GSN Games is behind the GSN Casino mobile app, gaming website GSN.com, and earlier this year it acquired Bash Gaming for an estimated \$160 million to \$170 million.

GMZ ENERGY PREPS FOR SELF-POWERED GAS BOILER

Waltham-based GMZ Energy has demonstrated its first product: a selfpowered gas boiler that has the ability to keep homes warm during natural disasters and extended power outages.

The boiler continues to operate without interruption because it incorporates GMZ's thermoelectric module that converts a portion of the system's internal heat directly into electricity. The company said the selfpowered boiler might be a low-cost alternative to a generator for a whole

How this nonprofit will help give more web users anonymity

The Mozilla Foundation, the nonprofit organization that makes the popular Firefox web browser, has teamed up with a Cambridge group, the Tor Project, to offer people a more anonymous web browsing experience. Over the next few months, those who downgoed Firefox as their web browser might notice something a little different. According to Andrew Lewman, executive director of the open source privacy network Tor Project, the partnership will offer construers the option to keep their identity, location and data away from government monitors and hackers. The so-called Polaris project with Mozilla is a first for the Tor Project – a nonprofit funded by the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Democracy, Human Rights, and

Labor and the Ford Foundation, among others – and will me mornore protections for users of Firefox and Thunderbird, a free, open-source email application created by Mozilla. Leoman said Tor has 30 full-time employees, including six in Cambridge's Central Square. The project has "a few fundred" development volunteers with about 6,000 "relay volunteers," who help to keep the network secure and private.
